

Smithills School pupils start forging their career at a special taster day

BRIGHT young things are engineering their way to a successful future.

Year 10 girls from Smithills High School took part in a engineering taster day They enjoyed a laste of vocational related activities hosted by Horwich-based Alliance Learning and GTA—Group Training Association—England The group of 10 students visited Alliance Learning's training centre to gain an insight into engineering and the different opportunities that this area could lead onto.

NEW Bolton MP Chris Green is continuing to champion the cause of apprentices – by taking one on himself.

The Tory MP for Bolton West, who came to power in May after ousting Labour's Julie Hilling, has regularly talked about the important role that apprentices can play in the country's economic recovery.

He has now revealed that he will be taking on an apprentice to work at his newly-established constituency office in Westhoughton.

Mr Green revealed the news follow-ing a visit to Horwich-based Alliance Learning, which is one of the largest apprenticeship providers in the UK. Speaking after the visit, he said: "We are looking to take on an apprentice to work in my new constituency office, which is opposite Westhoughton Town Hall Hall.

The person we select will be working in an administrative role and supporting other staff in the office.
"I have always believed that appren-

tices can make a huge contribution and it is vitally important to give peo-ple that experience, which can often help them to launch a career or move onto other employment."

In his summer Budget earlier this month, the Chancellor George Os-borne announced that three million new apprenticeships would be created by 2020 - funded by a levy on large em-

It was also announced, as part of the Welfare Bill, that young people aged between 18 and 21, who are on Univer-sal Credit, will have to apply for an ap-prenticeship or traineeship or go on a work placement six months after the start of their claim. Mr Green added: "The government

knows that apprenticeships are vital for our economic future and locally they can play a very important role in bringing forward the Chancellor's Northern Powerhouse vision. "It was great to come to Alliance Learning and see all the things being

done to help both people looking to be-come apprentices and firms who want to take people on in these roles."





Holiday job Lewis now an apprentice



It's a first for moulding firm as it takes on 17-year-old

A HOLIDAY job turned into a position as an apprentice for one lucky young man from Tonge Fold.

Lewis Proudfoot, aged Lewis Proudroot, aged 17, is the first apprentice to be hired as a result of the Mayor of Bolton Clir Martin Donaghy's drive to find 50 young people an apprenticeship during his 50 weeks in office.

Lewis is now an apprentice at SGH Moulds, a family business based in Tonge Bridge Industrial Estate in Bolton and his appointment is a first for the firm, too.

"We've never had an apprentice before, but we had been thinking about it for a while," said Lynn Farrell, director at SGH Moulds, which makes tools and plastic mouldings for everyone from car manufacturers to the medical industry.

She said fellow director Stephen Howarth had

read about the apprentice campaign in The Bolton News and he contacted Alliance Training in

Horwich. Lewis had caught the bosses' eyes and, once Alliance Training got involved, he was soon set up on an apprenticeship which was a straightforward procedure, sald Lynn.

She added: "Lewis came to us on a holiday job, as his grandma Diane Baldwin already works here and has done for a number of years.

"He showed an interest in what he was doing and a lot of initiative — he is a

very practical person.

"It's my duty to do all I can to try and get as many young people into work in Bolton as I can, so they can learn a skill and earn some money."
